BREAKFAST IN THE CLASSROOM



Breakfast is delivered to the classroom

in insulated bags and students collect their meal on the way into the classroom.

Breakfast is eaten during the first few minutes of class while teachers take attendance and begin the day's lessons.

This model is most often used in elementary or K-8 buildings.

CHALLENGE

School playgrounds are enticing – children would rather go play than go eat.



Implement a school-wide *Breakfast In the Classroom* program so students have the opportunity to play before school, then eat as class begins.

CHALLENGE

Morning routines are busy so students may not have time to eat at home or in the cafeteria.

SOLUTION

Serving *Breakfast In the Classroom* allows students to start their day with a healthy meal.

CHALLENGE

School staff may be resistant to change.

SOLUTION

Do your homework in the planning stage to address concerns, and provide appropriate staff training for your school's specific needs.

* SOLUTION

Pilot the program in one school prior to rolling out district-wide.

- Trash bags e.g., one per classroom or one per hallway
- Trash cans e.g., one per hallway
- Desk wipes / hand wipes
- Placemats or disposable trays
- · Class rosters / meal attendance record sheet
